MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the Children's Community Network Annual General Meeting of 2022! I began my career with the agency in 2016 and looking back on the last 5 years, I'm blown away at the multiple challenges and huge amounts of uncertainty we overcame, in order to be standing here today.

In June 2021, the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services announced funding opportunities for urgent response services for certain agencies providing coordinated service planning. The Children's Community Network saw this as an opportunity to continue to grow our business given our strategic plan highlighted a roadmap to diversify, partner and expand current services.

Given the strategic direction, the Children's Community Network volunteered to be lead URS agencies within Northeastern Ontario. After a considerable amount of work, collaboration and determination, we saw it come to fruition in February 2022 when the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services announced Children's Community Network would be granted with funding URS services for Sudbury-Manitoulin, Sault-Ste-Marie, North Bay, Parry Sound and the Muskokas.

With this announcement, not only did the Children's Community Network receive an influx in funding, but we also saw change to our geographic service area and the ability to provide clinical services that were not possible before the agency grew to cover the district.

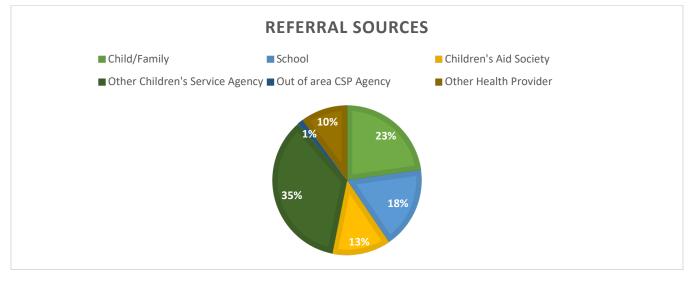

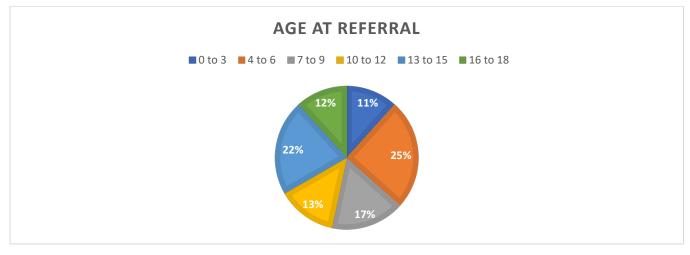
Coordinated Service Planning

FASD Program

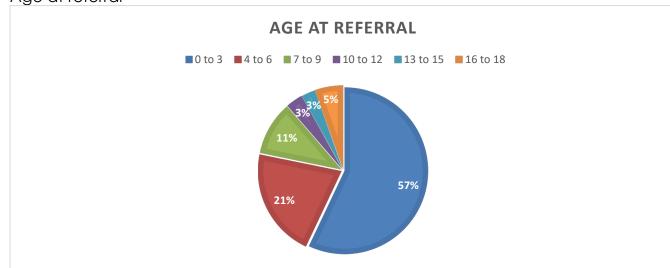

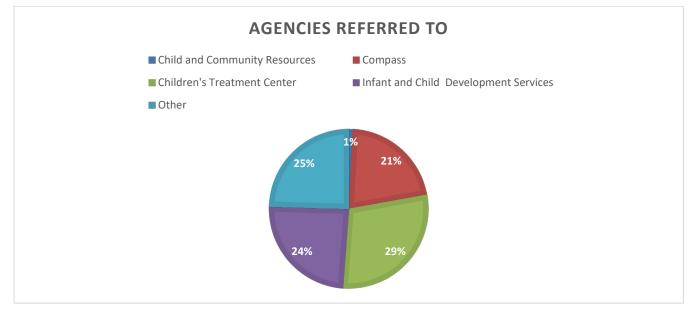
Intake Review

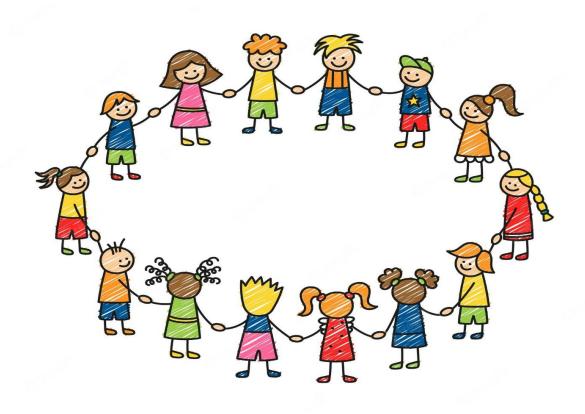
